




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INTRODUCTION



Suburb Profiles

Mackay City - Inner-city living has recently become more popular in the city centre of Mackay with the erection of a number of apartment buildings. It is home to a mixture of business, residential and recreation areas including Art Space, the Blue Water Lagoon and Bluewater Quay, Memorial Swim Centre and Caneland Central Shopping Centre.

South, East and West Mackay suburbs are all located within 5 minutes from the city. Mackay Base Hospital is situated in West Mackay. The area contains a mixture of new and old housing including some of Mackay's beautiful old Queenslanders. Located in the area are Illawong and Iluka Beach and the Botanic Gardens.

North Mackay is located about 4kms from the city, has a mixture of old and new residential areas as well as a recreational area called the Gooseponds with walking track and exercise stations.

Mt Pleasant is situated around 3-4kms from the city and contains a mixture of residential and business areas including Mt Pleasant Shopping Centre and Greenfields containing a number of large retail outlets and a movie theatre.

Glenella is situated around 5kms north of Mackay off the Bruce Highway and is close to shopping facilities in the Mt Pleasant area and North Point Retail.

Andergrove and **Beaconsfield** are situated in between North Mackay and the Northern Beaches around 5 – 8kms from the city and has a mixture of residential, business and recreational areas including two golf courses nearby.

The Northern Beaches, located 15 - 20 minutes north of the city has expanded quickly over the last few years as a popular residential area and include the suburbs listed below. The recreational areas mainly include the beaches and adjacent parks.

- Rural View located close to the shops at the Northern Beaches Central
- **Eimeo** located 14kms from the city with the Eimeo Pacific Hotel on the cliff top which offers a spectacular view over the Coral Sea and islands.
- Blacks Beach located 16kms from the city centre contains the city's longest stretch of beach (6kms)
- Dolphin Heads located 17kms from the city
- Bucasia located 16kms from the city
- Shoal Point is Mackay city's most northern suburb located about 20kms north of the city

Mackay Harbour with the Mackay Marina Village is located around 6.5kms from the city heart. The marina has expanded over the last few years and the Marina Village is now home to both residential, business and recreational areas including Harbour Beach and its adjacent park.

Slade Point is situated north of the Mackay Harbour, about 12kms from the city. Lamberts beach lookout provides views over the Cumberland Islands.

Racecourse and **Ooralea** are located just south of the city gates and are both close to the Mackay Base Hospital and the city.

Walkerston located 14kms west of Mackay. This suburb has also expanded greatly over the last few years as Mackay continues to grow. It is home to a mixture of both business and recreational areas.

Habana is located just over 20kms north of the city and includes mainly rural residential settings.

Paget located just south of the city's airport is the industrial area of Mackay and home to many of the businesses supporting the regions coal mining industry.


Bakers Creek is located 10kms south of Mackay along the Bruce Highway and is close to one of Mackay's golf courses.

Sarina is located just under 40kms south of Mackay along the Bruce Highway. Sarina has grown in popularity over the last few years with its attractive residential areas along its beaches. It is home to a number of beachside settlements which are becoming very popular. They include Sarina Beach, Campwin Beach, Grasstree Beach and Armstrong Beach.

Public Transport

Mackay currently only has buses and taxis providing public transport within the region. Unfortunately there aren't any trains, trams or ferries. If you do require public transport, we recommend you consider the bus routes and timetables as part of your decision in choosing a suburb/location to live.

Taxis

To book a taxi Australia-wide simply call 131 008. A taxi will pick you up and drop you off for a fee depending on the distance travelled. It is recommended that you ask the taxi driver how much they expect the cost to be prior to taking the journey.

There are also taxi ranks in the city where taxis will stop and wait for bookings. These are located in Wood Street and Victoria Street.

There are also a number of local limousine and transfer companies available.

CHILD CARE

About Childcare in Queensland

A number of options are available to parents with young children.

Child Care/Day Care Centres usually care for children under school age. They are built especially for childcare and can be privately owned, government owned or run for non-profit. Child Care centres can also offer Approved kindergarten (Pre-Prep) programs.

Family Day Care: is provided by experienced carers from their own home. Care is primarily for children under the school age however some carers offer before and after school care for Primary School aged children. Often carers are able to offer flexible and extended hours of care.

Before / After School Care (or Outside School Hours Care - OSHC): is supervised care and recreation for school aged children (5yrs +). This care is usually associated with the school and operated by the community. Hours are often from 7-9am and 3-6pm.

Vacation Care: is offered to Primary School aged children on School holidays. Like OSHC, Vacation Care is generally associated with the school and usually runs from 7am – 6pm weekdays.

PCYC is one of the largest Outside School Hours Care Providers. For more information please contact PCYC on 4942 3296.

Nannies: are employed by you to provide child care services in your home. They can work on a live-in or live-out basis. Duties can also include some domestic tasks. Some Nannies will have qualifications while others may only have previous experience. Agencies can be used to find Nannies who have been screened.

Babysitters: provide care on a part-time or as needs basis in your home. Like Nannies, if you would like a registered babysitter who has had reference and background checks you should contact an agency.

Schooling in Queensland

Preparatory (Prep) education provides a firm foundation for formal schooling. Primary school is from Year 1 to Year 6.

Secondary school (or High School) is from Year 7 to Year 12.

Choosing a School

In Queensland the three main education providers are:

- Queensland Government
- Catholic Education
- Independent schools

Government schools are often called State Schools or Public Schools. Non-government schools are often called Private Schools. Most Private schools have a religious affiliation, but some are non-denominational. All Government schools are non-denominational. In the Private sector there are co-educational and single-sex schools at Primary and at Secondary level. All Queensland Government schools are co-educational.

If you choose to send your child/ren to State/Public Schools you will be required to pay for uniforms, school excursions and often books and stationery for your child. Private schools attract **fees** which will vary from school to school.

Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) developed a website which enables you to search the profiles of almost 10,000 Australian schools. You are able to quickly locate statistical and contextual information about schools and compare them with statistically similar schools across the country. - Bluewater Lagoon is located in River Street with three tiered lagoons, a children's aquatic playground, cafe and BBQ facilities. Entry is free.
- Memorial Swim Centre is located in the city and the Pioneer Swim Centre located in North Mackay. Both pools have a 50m (8 lane Olympic pool) and a toddler's pool.

Beaches

There are over 30 beautiful beaches in the Mackay region. Some of the closest beaches around Mackay are:

- Illawong Beach, Far and Town Beach closest to the city
- Harbour Beach next to the Mackay Marina, about 10 minute drive from the city
- Lamberts Beach at Slade Point, 15 minutes from the city centre
- Blacks Beach, Eimeo Beach, Bucasia Beach and Shoal Point, located at the Northern Beaches, 15-20 minutes from the city centre

All north Queensland beaches attract marine stingers and box jellyfish from October to May. Some of the patrolled beaches in the Mackay Region have stinger-resistant enclosures so visitors can enjoy swimming throughout the year. Please ensure you check with local authorities before entering the water during the stinger season.

To stay safe at the beach - remember FLAGS!

- F Find the flags and swim between them as it is the safest place to swim marked by the lifeguards
- L Look at the safety signs
- A Ask the lifesaver for some good advice about the water conditions
- **G** Get a friend to swim with you
- **S** Stick your hand up for help

Mackay also has a number of Sporting Clubs, many located in the suburbs which offer 'bistro' type food. Many also offer a courtesy vehicle service picking up and dropping off guest to nearby suburbs. Harrup Park Country Club and Souths Mackay are two sporting clubs very close to the Mackay Base Hospital with great facilities and a courtesy bus.

Mt Pleasant Shopping Centre is located in Mt Pleasant and is also open 7 days a week. It contains approximately 70 speciality shops as well as Coles and Woolworth's supermarkets and Kmart.

There are also a number of retail shops in the Mackay City Heart as well as Sydney Street Markets Shopping Centre containing a small number of shops and restaurants as well as Coles Supermarket.

SALARY SACRIFICING

Salary packaging' or 'salary sacrificing' is an arrangement between an employer and an employee, where the employee agrees to forgo part of their future salary or wages in return for other benefits of a similar value.

Your own personal circumstances will determine whether you can benefit from salary packaging. Queensland Government strongly recommends that you obtain independent financial advice prior to commencing salary packaging. Participating in the salary packaging arrangements is voluntary and at the sole risk of the employee. Queensland Government has approved the salary packaging arrangements on the condition that there is no additional cost to agencies.

Weather

The Mackay area has a tropical climate. Summers are generally hot and wet, though the coast has the benefit of a regular afternoon sea breeze. Winter days are generally warm and sunny, while winter nights can be cool away from the coast.

Mackay's average annual rainfall is 1585mm. A large proportion falls in the months December through to March with the driest months being August/September.

Maximum daytime temperatures are typically 29-30 degrees during the summer/wet months and 21-25 degrees during the winter/dry months. Minimum overnight temperatures are typically around 23 degrees during the summer/wet months and 13-14 degrees during the winter/dry months.

Ensure you drink plenty of water to avoid dehydration - at least eight glasses of water a day is recommended.

Sun safety

The ultraviolet radiation (UVR) of the sun is intense all year round in Mackay. To avoid overexposure to the sun follow the "Slip, Slop, Slap, Seek, Slide recommendations i.e. Slip on a shirt, Slop on some sunscreen, Slap on a hat, Seek shade and Slip on some sunnies! This is especially important with children as their skin is more sensitive to the sun and long term sun damage can occur easier. It is also a good idea to wear good quality sunglasses when out in the sun, especially on the water.

Cyclones

Cyclones are a natural occurrence in tropical climates which can bring destructive winds and flooding. Plenty of warnings are given to residents in the event of a cyclone through radio and television stations and the Bureau of Meteorology will also issue regular updates.

Wildlife

As a tropical region we do share our beautiful paradise with a few interesting creatures! Most are not dangerous at all but as a new resident in Mackay you need to familiarise yourself with the species that can be.

The main danger wildlife in the Mackay region is marine stingers, salt water crocodiles and snakes. Although present, it is very rare that you would come across any of them in everyday life. However, it is important to be aware of their dangers and what to do if you come in contact with one of them.

Marine stingers

The most dangerous marine stingers frequenting the coastal waters of North Queensland between October and May are the Box Jelly fish and the Irukandji.

The Box Jellyfish is found in shallow water and has a box-shaped bell which can be up to 10 cm in diameter and tentacles that can extend to 3 meters in length. It is also almost transparent which makes it extremely hard to spot. Severe stings may cause the victim to stop breathing or their heart to stop, potentially resulting in death.

The Irukandji only used to be found around reefs and islands but has recently also been found along coastal beaches in North Queensland. The Irukandji is also extremely hard to spot as it is transparent and only the size of a fingernail with four thin tentacles. Initially the sting is only felt as a minor skin sting but followed by severe symptoms up to 45 minutes post contact. The sting from some species can cause very high blood pressure or affect the heart, potentially resulting in death.

In order to prevent getting stung always swim at patrolled beaches, between the red and yellow flags and if swimming during the stinger season make sure you wear a stinger suit. Do not touch marine stingers washed up on the beach as they can still sting you.

First Aid for marine stings

1	Call for help	Dial 000 for help (112 from mobiles), seek help from lifesaver or life guard
2	Emergency Care	Provide CPR if required

3 Treat the sting Flood the sting with vinegar for a minimum of 30 seconds

4 Seek Medical Aid Transport to hospital

Salt water crocodiles

Salt water crocodiles are not as frequent in the Mackay area as in Far North Queensland; however, they do exist in the river systems around Mackay. Adhere to all warning signs when fishing and do not swim in our rivers.

Snakes

There are many venomous snakes in Queensland. Snakes should never be approached or handled. Most snake bites happen when people are trying to catch, kill or handle a snake.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Understanding the Australian Workplace

New entrants to the Australian Workplace often struggle to understand the workplace culture. The following information has been taken from the NSW Government Department of Industry webpage.

Australian Society Today

Within the framework of Australia's laws, all Australians are able to express their culture and beliefs and to participate freely in Australia's national life. All Australians are equal under the law. This means that nobody should be treated differently from anybody else due to their race, ethnicity or country of origin; their age, gender, marital status or disability; or their political or religious beliefs.

Being treated equally means that getting a job or being promoted must be on the basis of a person's skills, ability and experience, not their cultural background or political beliefs. It also means that people cannot be refused service in a shop or hotel or other service facility because of their race, colour, religion, gender or marital status.

Migrants often find Australian work culture quite different from their own countries. It is important to familiarise yourself with work cultural practices to be able to work effectively with others once employed.

The Australian workplace is usually not overly formal and hierarchical but there are clear lines of authority and decision making. Workers usually talk on an equal basis with their superiors. All workers should be treated with respect regardless of position.

Clothing

The types of clothing that people wear reflect the diversity in Australian society just as much as the variation in climate. There are no laws or rules on clothing and people from other countries can choose to wear culturally appropriate dress. However, most workplaces have a dress code which may or may not be written in formal guidelines. It is recommended that you ask employers if there are specific dress codes that you are expected to conform to. Some examples might be:

- **Uniforms**: Many workplaces use uniforms for some or all staff to promote the business or for safety reasons. Uniforms may be supplied by the employer or the employee may be required to purchase these.
- **Safety Wear**: Certain jobs require employees to wear specific clothing and accessories for safety. Common examples include reflective-coloured and protective clothing, steel capped boots and a hard hat. This may be required for the employer to comply with Australia Workplace Safety Laws and is compulsory.
- You will need to become familiar with the Mackay Hospital and Health Services workplace policies relating to Equal Employment Opportunity, Anti-Discrimination, Bullying and Harassment. These policies will be explained in your orientation process.

Australian Slang and Social Customs

There are very few social customs which apply only in Australia. However, in some cases, there are differences in emphasis or approach compared to practices in other countries.

While English is Australia's national language, there are certain words and expressions that have become regarded as uniquely Australian through common usage (called "slang"), and some of them might seem strange or confusing to new arrivals. For example, 'barbie' for a barbeque, 'arvo' for afternoon, 'Aussie' for Australian.

If unsure what a person means by their words or actions, it is important to ask either that person or a friend, neighbour or work colleague for clarification.
