Toowoomba's climate can best be described as pleasant, with temperature ranges averaging a cool 5° to 16° in winter and a mild 17° to 27° in summer.

About Toowoomba Hospital

Last year the Emergency Department saw 63,285 presentations of which 44% were admitted. There were 2,097 babies born. A total of 10,889 operations were performed.

The Hospital serves a large catchment area throughout southern inland Queensland including to the South Burnett and South West of the State. About 59% of all patients admitted come from outside Toowoomba city.

The University of Queensland's Rural Clinical School is also based at the Hospital, with 36 2nd and third year students and 36 fourth year students on campus for their current academic year.
